### **NEIGHBORHOOD**



#### FOCUS

Learn about you neighborhood and how to keep it clean.



#### PREPARE

- 1. Tools for writing, cutting, coloring, and pasting.
- 2. Desktop printer.
- 3. Three paper bags, boxes, or plastic containers.



#### **COMMENCE**

- 1. Begin the lesson by thanking God for the new day, and asking Him for wisdom to complete today's lesson.
- 2. Read Deuteronomy 10:14.



#### **VOCABULARY WORD**

Cut out and stick the vocabulary word NEIGHBORHOOD on your Learner's Wall (See Lesson 1, ACTIVITY FOR VOCABULARY WORD).



#### TEACH THE STUDENT

Our vocabulary word for today is NEIGHBORHOOD. This is the area around our home. A neighborhood is made up of living creatures such as humans, animals, plants, trees, and the systems keeping our neighborhoods clean, safe, and productive, like government, businesses, and local churches.



As stewards of creation, one way to take care of our neighborhood is to properly manage our garbage. Many establishments in the Philippines classify garbage into three: Recyclable waste, biodegradable waste, and non-biodegradable waste (Other establishments classify garbage into biodegradable, recyclable, and non-recyclable).

Recyclable waste are items we can still use for another product. Paper, cans, bags, and plastic bottles are recyclable. Paper waste, for example, can be processed and turned into recycled paper sheets for scrapbooks and paper bags.





Biodegradable waste are items that easily break down, especially when placed in the soil. These are rubbish from vegetable and fruit peelings, waste from fish and meat, leftover food, and tissue paper. Biodegradable waste is used as organic fertilizer for gardens and farms.

Non-biodegradable waste do not break down easily. This is sometimes called non-recyclable. Examples of non-biodegradable waste are printed circuit boards (PCB), rubber, foam, and plastic. This waste can harm our health and seriously damage the environment when not disposed properly.





#### **CAFE SANTIAGO**

It was a busy day at Café Santiago. James, the coffee shop's owner, arrived on his bicycle. He instantly noticed their garbage bin overloaded with paper and plastic waste. Part of its trash spilled out on the sidewalk beside the shop. The smell was annoying.

James parked his bike in the garage and wore a pair of disposable gloves. Then he went to the shop's office and spoke to his store manager.

"Why is our garbage like that?" James asked. "Was it like that when you arrived this morning?"

"I didn't notice, Sir." His newly hired store manager went over to check the garbage bin from the window. "Maybe the cats did it again."

"We can't blame the cat, Austin," James replied. He walked to the sidewalk to check how he can clean the garbage. Austin left his work and followed closely, feeling a little embarrassed for what happened.

"It's our job to keep our shop and our surroundings clean." James reminded Austin. James took the broomstick and dustpan and started sweeping. From the spilt garbage, he found a torn plastic bag with rotting fish gills and intestines mixed with paper and cardboards. The cat might have done it. James said in his mind. But someone needs to know how to segregate garbage properly.



As the owner of their shop, James knew he should lead his employees. So, he took the fish waste and threw it into the garbage bin designated for biodegradable waste.

"I'm sorry, for what happened, sir." The shop supervisor went over to help. Two other staff saw what happened and helped out.

After cleaning the sidewalk in front of their shop, James gathered his workers. "God wants us to take care of our shop so we can be a good model in this neighborhood," James said, "And when we are faithful with these little things, God will trust us with bigger things," he said. [END]

#### **PREPARATION:**

- 1. Cutout the waste symbols on the next three pages and stick them on the paper bag designated for their respective waste category.
- 2. Print out the cards in vellum board. You can also print in bond paper. Then paste the paper on a cartolina to make the cards sturdy. Cutout each card and make a card deck.

#### **GAME INSTRUCTIONS:**

- 1. Align the paper bags together.
- 2. Shuffle the cards and place the deck on the table face down.
- 3. Players will take turns getting one card. Read the card and decide which waste bin it belongs to.
- 4. Score each player. If the card is placed on the correct waste box, the player earns 5 points. If the answer is wrong, the teacher/guardian will remove the card and place it in the correct waste box. The player with the wrong answer will get a deduction of 7 points.
- 5. Use the waste disposal guide below as your reference.




